

**TOWN OF AUBURN
SPECIAL TOWN MEETING
OCTOBER 21, 2014**

At 7:00 PM on a motion by John Anderson and seconded by Scott Taylor the meeting was postponed until a quorum was present. At 7:14 PM Moderator Charles A. Baker called the meeting to order in the Auburn High School Auditorium with a quorum present. The Moderator appointed Jeffrey Mitchell, Kristen Pappas, Paul Kosky, John O'Day, Glenn Feldman, and John Anderson as counters who were sworn in by the Town Clerk.

In compliance with the provisions of the Auburn Charter, copies of the warrant along with the recommendations of the Finance Committee were mailed to each Town Meeting Member on October 6, 2014. Constable Anthony Coccio, Jr. posted attested copies of the warrant in at least two conspicuous places in each precinct on October 7, 2014.

Article 1. REPORTS OF COMMITTEES

Finance Committee

When we last met in May you approved a \$55.6MM budget for fiscal 2015. In the five months since that Annual town Meeting, funding for the 2015 budget from Beacon Hill and several other sources have been finalized, with only minor changes from the Annual Town Meeting estimates. Our town CFO will have a presentation with highlights and modifications to the 2015 budget.

Article 2 thru 18 recommend approvals with the following comments:

Article 2 makes minor adjustments to the Operating budget; however, \$7,500 will be added to the Youth Commission operating budget, with other offsetting reductions, resulting in a net \$500 change in the total operating budget.

Article 5 thru 9 finalize changes in the CIP to repurpose School capital funds as previously outlined.

Article 10 involves minor land-taking required to widen West Street for the new Auburn Middle School.

Article 12 and Articles 14 through 18 repurpose previously approved CIP and warrant articles within the DPW for various unrelated needs.

Article 13 adds \$200,000 to the Stabilization Fund.

Articles 19 thru 21 recommend approval.

Articles 22 and 23 defer to petitioner, which are street acceptances.

Regarding the other articles not commented on in this report, they are either self-explanatory or I would prefer to defer to the petitioner for additional explanation and comments.

An Overview of the Progress that is being Made

One of the goals of the new Progress and Performance Index (PPI) system is to **Increase** the number of students scoring in the Advanced and Proficient categories while **Decreasing** the number of students scoring in the Needs Improvement and Warning categories

Auburn's students scored at or above the state average on 16 of the 17 grade level/subject-specific MCAS tests *for students scoring Advanced or Proficient*

In rankings of all Commonwealth public schools, in 12 of the 24 categories, divided by school, grade level and subject, Auburn students scored in the *top third* and in 9 of those 12 Auburn students scored the top 25% or better when compared to like schools/grade levels.

Highlights of MCAS Successes Across Schools:

- JB 3rd grade students scored in the top 11% in Math and at 5th grade students scored in the top 10% in Mathematics
- PAK 3rd grade students ranked in the top 13% across the Commonwealth in Math and the top 18% in ELA

- 82% of AMS 8th grade students scored Advanced or Proficient in English Language Arts
- AHS 10th grade students – scoring Advanced or Proficient as follows: 96% in English; 91% in Math; and 89% in Science & Technology
- Curriculum Teams are continuously working to refine and strengthen curriculum, instruction and assessment
- High Quality Professional Development continues to be offered and staff members have numerous opportunities for professional growth:

Pre-AP and AP trainings in English Language Arts, Math and Science; Keys to Literacy K-8 and Co-Teaching; Technology Trainings on iPads, the Flipped Classroom and Google.

Strong Mentoring and Induction Program:

New teachers are supported by a mentor, attend regular meetings, mentors and protégés visit each others' classrooms, with administrative support likewise provided
